Why the Asian Route?

Asia, the birthplace of some of the oldest civilizations, is the fastest growing economic centre in the world and home to half the world's population. The 21st century has been dubbed the "Asian century" because of the rapidly rising economic, cultural and political importance on the world stage of Asian countries, especially China, Korea and Japan. The need for people to acquire a deep understanding of Asian societies, languages, politics and economy is increasingly important. Recruitment of graduates with competency in an Asian language is growing annually - this is a hugely desirable and important skill to have.

WHAT CAN ASIAN STUDIES GRADUATES OFFER EMPLOYERS?

Your degree will provide you with important professional and transferable skills that position you in a unique position to build careers with all organisations, both national and multinational in the private and public sector related to Asia, arming you with an in-depth knowledge of Asian society and culture and at least one Asian language.

- Communicate on a wide range of topics in at least one major Asian language: Chinese, Korean or Japanese

- Academic writing and research skills embedded in a cross-cultural and multilingual context.

- Deep understanding of the various aspects of history and culture of Asia

- Academic expertise on East Asian economies and societies, and their importance in a global context

- Highly developed leadership and team-working abilities, cross-cultural awareness and flexibility



- Understanding of the Asian market and the needs of the East Asian consumer

- Thorough knowledge of the legal, cultural and entrepreneurial challenges of doing business in Asia



GRADUATE OUTCOMES FOR ASIAN STUDIES

Each year UCC Career Services produces a Graduate Outcomes Report based on an annual survey of graduates six months after graduation. UCC students study Asian Studies or Chinese Studies as subjects offered within the three year Bachelor of Arts (BA) programme or the four year Bachelor of Arts (International) Degree. Over the last 4 years 90%+ of Bachelor of Arts graduates progress to employment or further study:

Your BA degree is a foundation for a further course of study, which will provide career-specific training in a particular area of Asian Studies or Chinese Studies. UCC Asian Studies offers a unique one-year taught MA degree allowing you to further develop and hone your academic and language skills. For those who have focused on Chinese language there is also a MA in Teaching Chinese to Speakers of Other Languages (MATCSOL) with extensive work-placements, while the MA in Translation Studies (with Asian languages) would also provide a track for those interested in becoming translators and interpreters or subtitling. For those interested in research, there is also a four-year PhD programme at UCC and many possibilities at other universities.

As Asia plays an ever more important role in the world, the many domestic and international companies and institutions that are doing business or working with Asia are increasing. 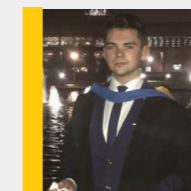
Graduate Profile 3 ALANA DOOLEY
