

WHAT IS A SPEECH AND LANGUAGE THERAPIST?

Speech and Language Therapists provide life-changing intervention and support for children and adults who have difficulties with communication, eating, drinking and swallowing

WHERE DO GRADUATES OF SPEECH AND LANGUAGE THERAPY IN UCC WORK?

Many graduates go on to employment in clinical settings in the community where they work with children and adults, in voluntary organisations such as intellectual disability services or services for people with autism spectrum disorders (ASD), and in hospital settings where they may work with people following a brain injury, people with degenerative disorders, or care for the elderly. Some graduates choose to continue their education in UCC or other universities. Some graduates choose to work in the research aspect of speech and language therapy. Graduates take the opportunity to travel and work abroad. Recent graduates are working in the UK, the Middle East, Asia and Australia.

PROGRAMME STRUCTURE AND CONTENT

The BSc (Hons) Speech and Language Therapy is a four year, full-time course. The aim of the programme is to educate, train and support individuals to a high standard. The completion of the BSc (Hons) Speech and Language Therapy in UCC provides students with an academic qualification that is required in order to apply to register with the Irish Association of Speech and Language Therapists (IASLT) and the Irish health regulator CORU.

Teaching Methods

Teaching methods include: practice education, lectures, workshops, anatomy labs, and Problem-Based Learning (PBL) tutorials. The aim of PBL is to encourage independent,

self-directed learning in group settings. PBL prepares students to develop the functioning knowledge which allows them to integrate the academic knowledge base, the skills required for that profession and the context for using them to solve problems in the workplace.

Clinical Placement

Practice Education comprises of 450 hours of clinical placement spread throughout the programme in years 1, 2, 3, and 4 to facilitate the application of knowledge gained during the academic year.

Practice Education is delivered through a partnership between the University, the Health Service Executive, and voluntary organisations. These placements take place throughout Ireland.

ENTRY REQUIREMENTS

School Leavers: Six subjects in the Leaving Certificate from: Irish, English, another language, Mathematics, a laboratory science subject (i.e. Chemistry, Physics, Biology, Physics with Chemistry (joint) or Agricultural Science) and one other are recognised as meeting minimum entry requirements.

Minimum of HC3 grade in two subjects including a science subject and a language (other than English) are also required.
